

Confidentiality / IP Assignment Agreements

Intellectual property is present in almost every business.

Customer lists, pricing information, methods of operation – all of these may provide your business with a competitive advantage. Some business have additional issues to cover, such as ownership of patents and copyrights created or conceived by their workers. Written agreements assigning such intellectual property rights to the employer are essential for patents and helpful for avoiding questions about copyright ownership and obligations. These are typically handled in an invention assignment agreement covering both the IP assignment and protection of the employer's confidential information and trade secrets. These agreements often contain restrictive covenants as well.
